My dear Graduates:



CLASS

The summer of 1958 suddenly passed into memories as the class of 1962 left their homes to come to St. Bonaventure University. While we were trying to get in our last few flings, mothers busily rounded up clothing, gathered essentials for us and began packing them.

There was the day before "good-bye's" and the farewell toasts with relatives and cherished friends, many of whom left for Colleges and Universities across the country. But the glitter of an active summer didn't wear off until we stepped off that train at Olean, N. Y. There, we scrambled for a taxi that would take us to our home for four years. When we arrived on campus we were pleasantly greeted by Student Senators, who aided us in finding our rooms. We met our roommates and got acquainted with the other frosh.

The realization that we were in a new world—a world of learning—probably didn't jell in us until that first evening in our rooms.

Bright and early the next morning we awakened for breakfast, then hurried to an ancient gymnasium to begin an orientation program. Within a few days we were all given a dink and a tie.

Upperclassmen arrived on campus within a week. We were really scared then. At first we were marched into Butler Gym, while hundreds of screaming upperclassmen jammed the running track above us. Those were hard weeks for us, as we were placed in the mercy of Senator Corney Ahearn and Company.

After the first week of classes, activities commemorating the end of the initial 100 years at St. Bonaventure began. The Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, celebrated a Pontifical Mass on campus on Oct. 7, marking the beginning of the second century for our alma mater. Meanwhile around us and around all other parts of New York State, the political pot was boiling and some of us had an opportunity to share in the excitement. Many of us visited with Nelson Rockefeller, who toured this area as part of his Gubernatorial aspiration.

A stringent rules program ended in November with the presentation of the Frosh Frolic variety show. Days of hard work paid off as a capacity crowd viewed the two-hour spectacle in the gymnasium.

Before we knew it, the first bitter Bonaventure winter was upon us. Some of us weren't prepared. During the post mid-semester examination lull, six parties battled it out for freshman class positions. For our first slate of officers we elected Larry Knoll as president; Dick Loftus as vice-president; Jerry Ford as secretary and Tom Callahan as treasurer.

That last minute cramming became a part of our daily living after we got back from Christmas vacation. Our first attack on finals was only a few weeks away and we didn't know what to expect from these semester examinations.

That February sorrow struck the entire campus as the Very Rev. Thomas Plassmann, a legendary symbol of the Bonaventure way of life, died. The beloved Friar was affectionately known to all of us as "Father Tom."

HISTORY

A high point in those last few months of our freshman year was the selection of the Bonnies basketball team to the National Invitational Tournament at Madison Square Garden. The Brown Indians had churned a 20-2 regular season record. In April, we elected our first slate of senators, seating Chris Lawless, Jerry Ford and Dave Providence.

As much as we liked St. Bona's that first year, we were anxious to get home for summer vacation. But like any other summer, it sped by and soon we were sophomores. That year we initiated a highly successful event called the Winter Carnival. It was the first venture of its kind in Bonaventure History. Spotlighting the three-day Carnival was internationally famous jazz trombonist J. J. Johnson and as a resounding climax to the large-scale social program the Class of 1962 gave the about 2,000 who attended a course in The Four Lads.

Politics came to our attention again as we cast our ballots for our officers. Chuck Fischer was rewarded by his classmates for his stellar effort as Winter Carnival chairman. He was elected president, while Orrie Jirele was named vice-president; Tom Callahan as treasurer and Jim Smith as secretary.

For our prom we brought to the Olean Armory Count Basie, the most explosive force in jazz. That night we picked Orrie Jirele as "The Junior of the Year." Charlie Colgan headed arrangements for this special Junior night and, like Fischer, was later honored by being picked Senior Class president. Jerry Ford took the vice-presidency, Mary Lou Martini was chosen secretary and Mike Bedosky was voted treasurer. In the last month of our junior year, Dave Providence was named president of the Student Senate, while Tom Tobin captured the vice-presidency post.

During the 1961 summer ROTC students of our class were treated to a luxurious vacation at Fort Sill, Okla. While out West, many of them took advantage of the opportunity and toured that part of the country.

Then when we came in September we were on the final step toward our bachelor's degrees. By then we were acclimated to our new world and the Bonaventure way of life.

A three-way battle for class treasurer developed in September when Mike Bedosky didn't come back. Tom Rath won the run off.

Another major event sponsored by our class, which received overwhelming approval from the student body, was the appearance of the "Highwaymen" at the fabulous 1961 Fall Festival.

The days wore on; there were more parties, and dances . . . there were late lights before exams . . . there were moments of solitude in the chapel. Surely, we had our bad days and our good days.

But during these four years our class has shown its worth in the classroom, in the chapel and on the sports field. Our accomplishments and activities will leave their imprint on the archives of Bonaventure.

The Franciscan spirit will never leave us. We will always be trying to reach the highest goal one can possess as Christian Gentlemen and Bonaventure Men.

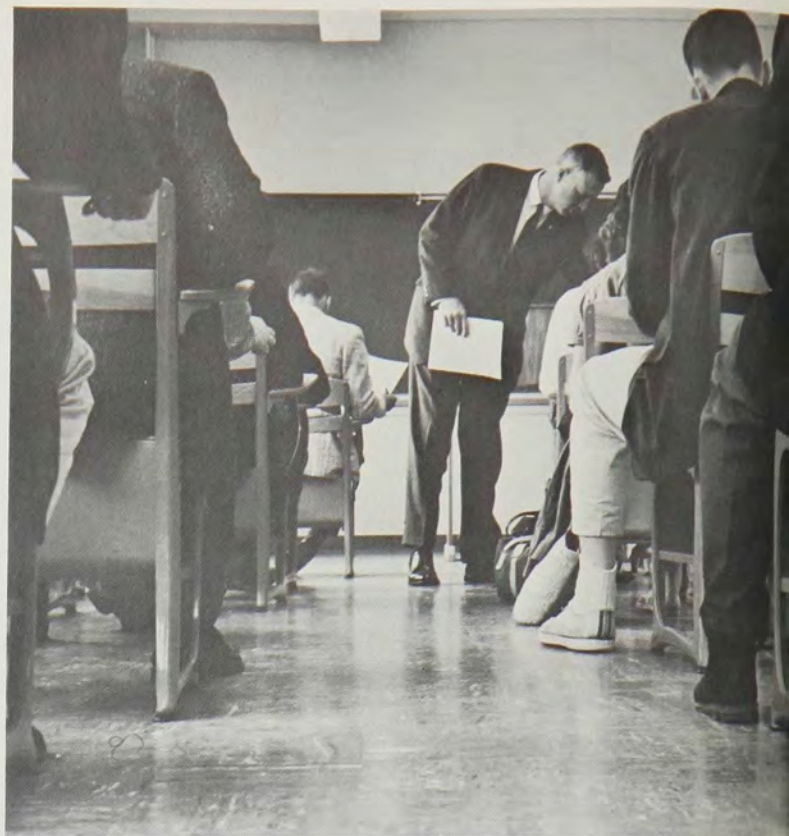
Activities moved into high gear prior to the Christmas recess.

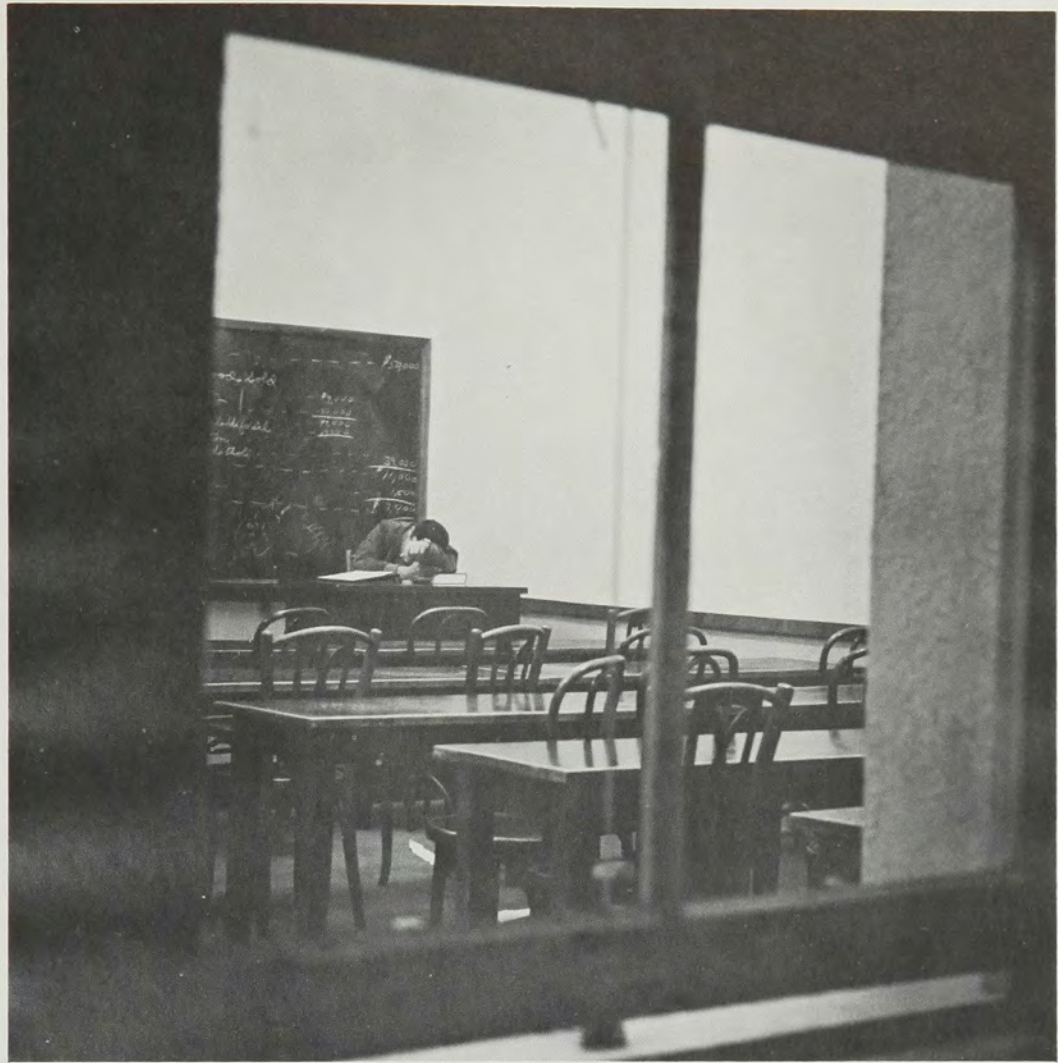
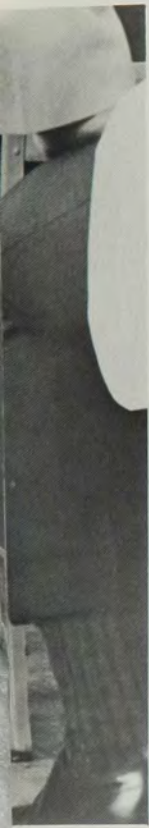




Hours of brain-washing as the "blue books" passed in four days . . . and from our windows we could see the endless snow-covered Allegany hills.

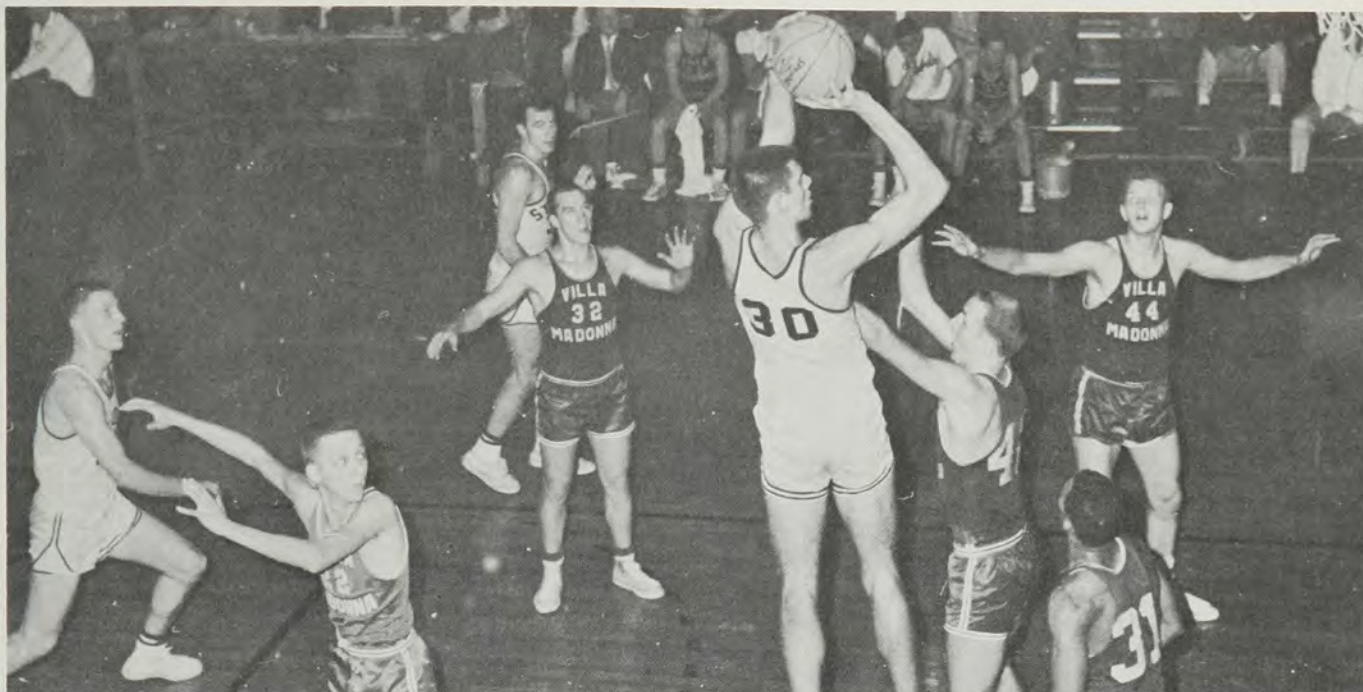

St. Bonaventure's Brown Indians made Coach Larry Weise's debut as Bonnie cage mentor a successful one as they trounced Kent State, 69-52 in the season opener at Buffalo's Memorial Auditorium.

Sophomore star Miles Aiken led the scoring parade with 17 points and was followed closely by Ed Petrovick with 16 and Bob McCully, who tossed in 13.

Five nights later the Bonnies returned to the Olean Armory for their second contest of the young season and whipped Villa Madonna, 82-59. Once again Miles Aiken grabbed the scoring laurels as he dropped in 31 points.

The appearance was the first for the Bonnies in the Olean Armory since last February when Niagara snapped their 99 game winning streak.

The Bonnies' next tilt found them meeting Xavier University, which at that time, was ranked ninth in the nation.

Even the most loyal followers could scarcely believe their eyes as the Brown Indians rolled over the Musketeers, 79-57 with surprising ease. For the third game in succession, soph phenom Miles Aiken paced the Bonnie scoring attack with 24 counters. Captain Orrie Jirele and Big Bob McCully contributed outstanding individual efforts as they completely throttled the Xavier scoring machine.

In the next contest the Bonnies ran their unbeaten skein to four games defeating Bellarmine 89-58 at the Olean Armory. Miles Aiken poured in 35 points and grabbed off 14 rebounds as the Brown Indians raced away from the visitors after leading, 40-35 at the half. The Bonnies rushed to a 66-39 margin after nine minutes of the second half to settle the issue.

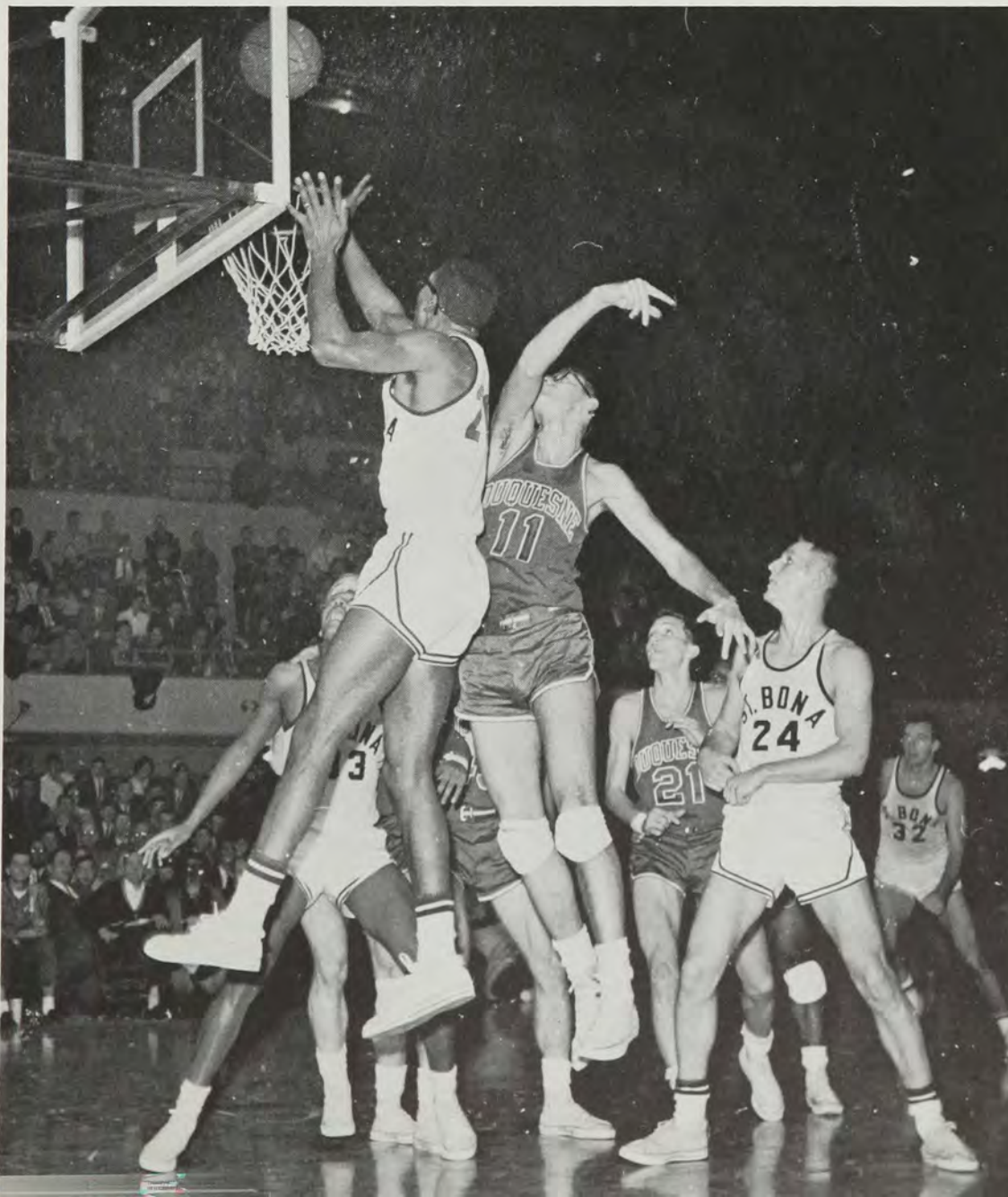

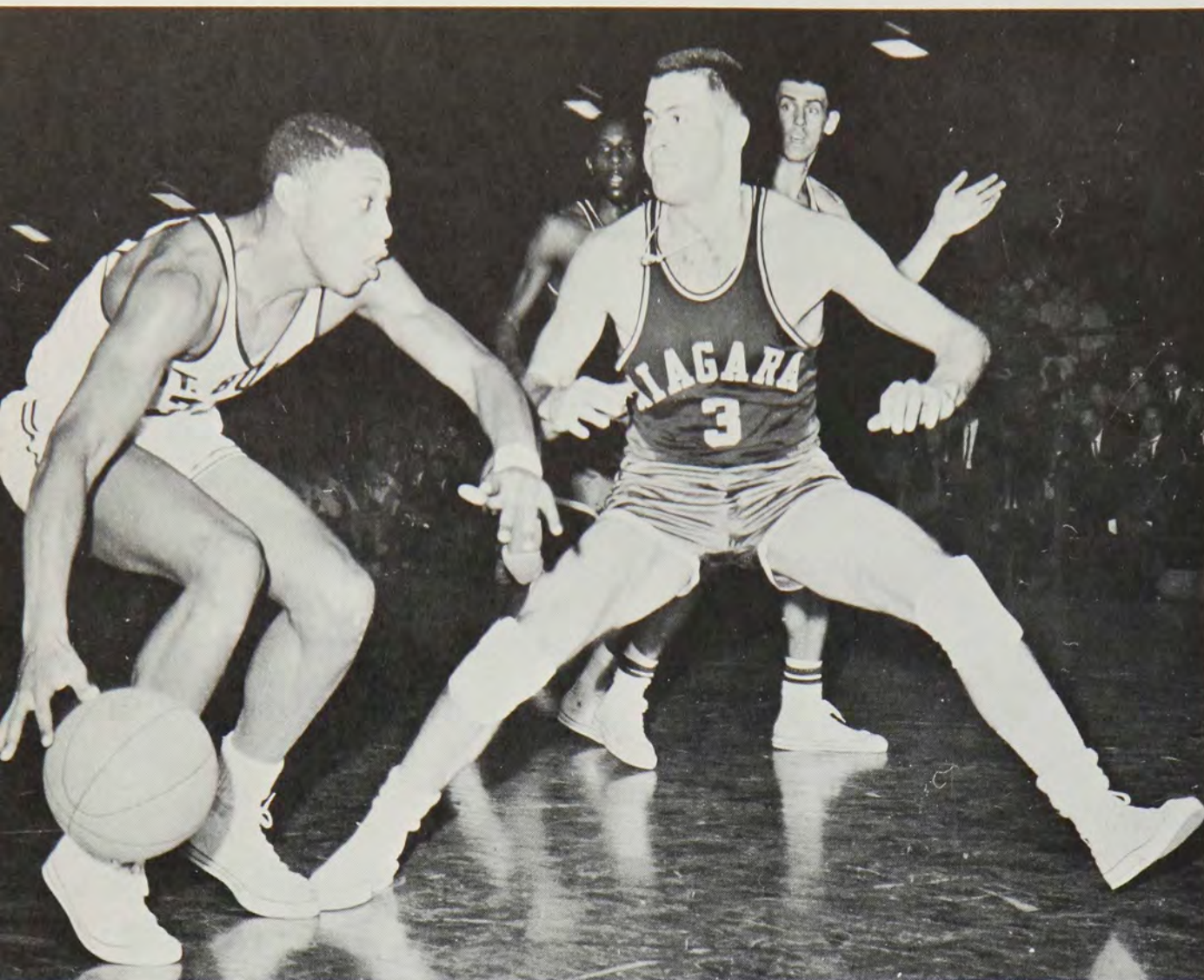
Now ranked ninth nationally in one poll and 15th in another, the Bonnies moved on to Louisville where they met Western Kentucky in the first game of the Bluegrass Tournament. After blowing a 13 point lead early in the second half, the Brown Indians rallied to nip the Hilltoppers at the wire, 66-65. Aiken and McCully led the Bonnie scoring with 22 and 18 points respectively. Western star Bobby Rascoe had 21 for the losers.

The next night the Bonnies became the first team in St. Bonaventure history to win a tournament as they outlasted the University of Louisville, 73-72 in another thriller. In this contest, Miles Aiken set two scoring marks as he hit for 36 points and a tourney total of 58. This erased the old mark of 29 for a single game set by the great Elgin Baylor of Seattle in 1957 and Notre Dame's Tom Hawkins in 1958. Also erased was Baylor's tourney total of 52 points.

Miles was voted the tournament's most valuable player and he and Bob McCully were selected for the All-Bluegrass Tournament team.

Three nights later Coach Larry Weise's charges suffered their initial defeat of the season as they bowed to the Duquesne Dukes, 75-57 at the Pitt Fieldhouse. With Ed Petrovick and Tom Hannon sidelined by injuries, the Bonnies managed to stay with the hot shooting Dukes for a half. However, following the intermission, Duquesne, led by Willie Somerset and Clyde Arnold, took a commanding lead and was never headed. Miles Aiken took the game's scoring laurels with 20 points.

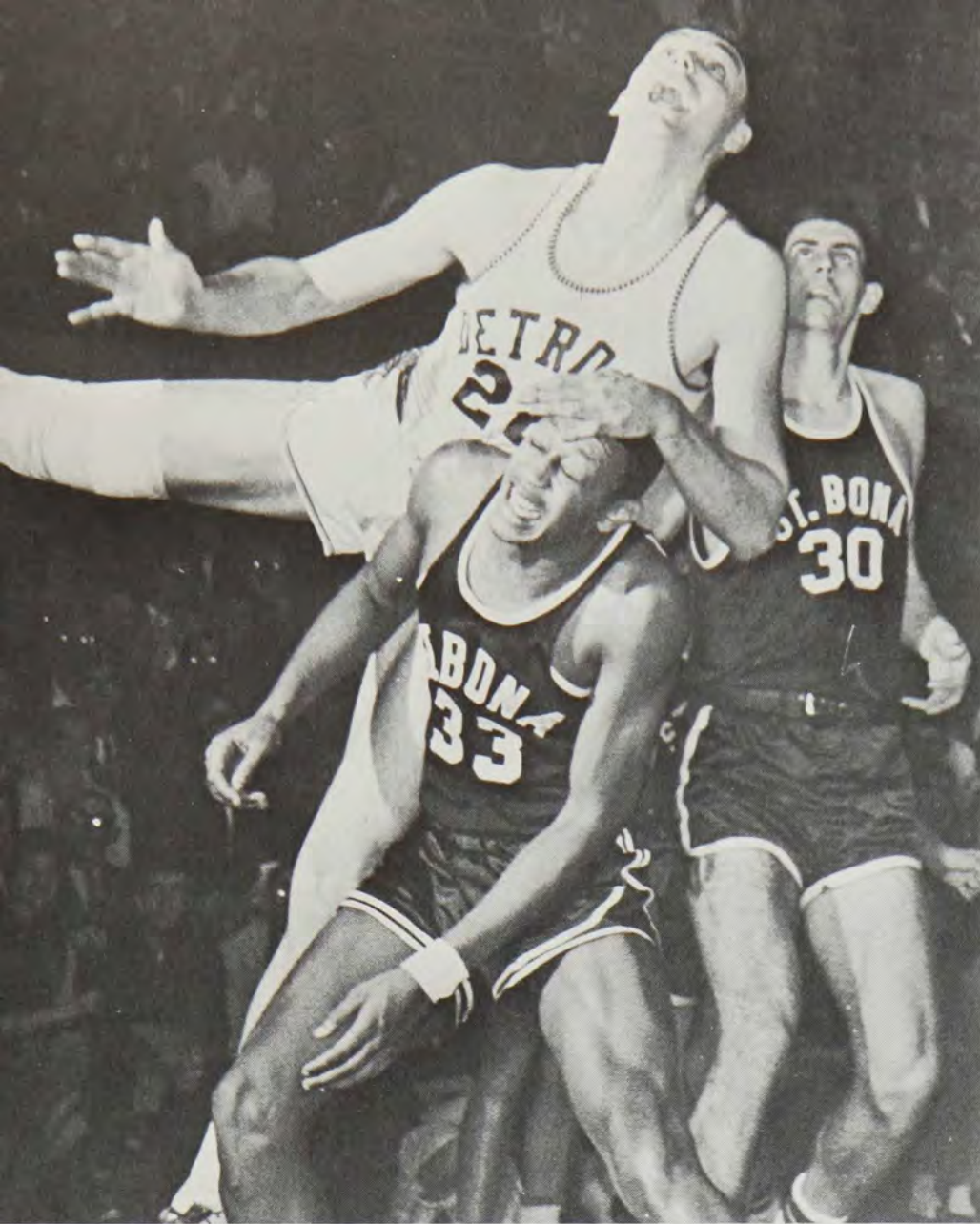
After the Christmas holidays the Bonnies journeyed to Detroit where they competed in the annual Motor City Tournament. With Miles Aiken sitting out the entire first game as a disciplinary move the Brown Indians handed DePaul its first defeat of the season, 70-60. Bob McCully led a balanced scoring attack with 17 points, followed by Tom Hannon's and Barry Herbert's 15 apiece.

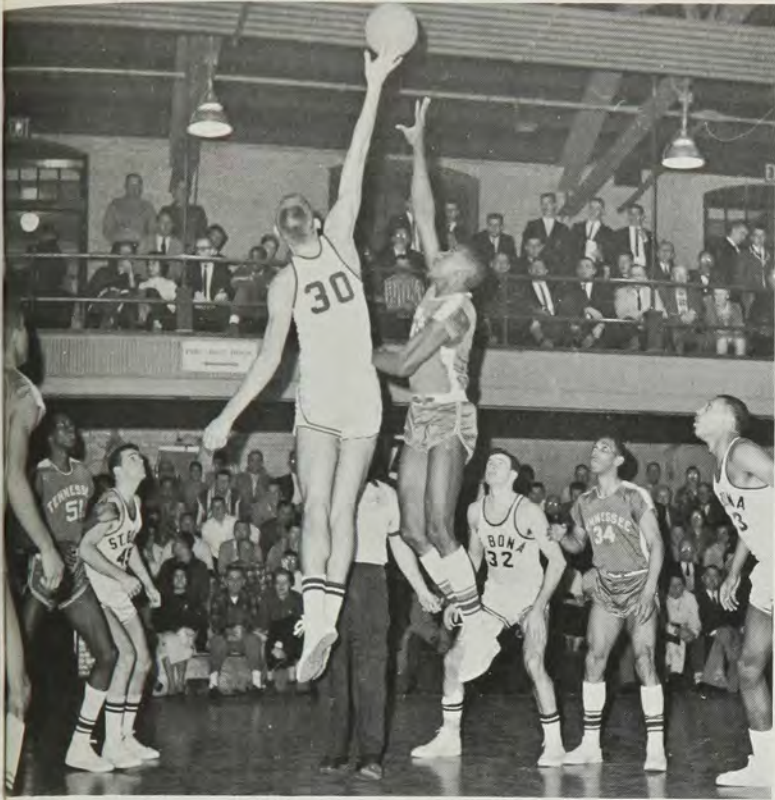
Now seeking a second consecutive tourney championship, the Bonnies met Detroit the following night in the finals. However, this time the Brown Indians had to settle for the runner-up spot as the Titans copped a 77-70 victory before 6,500 partisan fans. For the Bonnies, it was a case of 'too little, too late' as they rallied late in the second half, but could never quite catch U-D. Ed Petrovick led the Bonnies with 20 points. Detroit's Dave Debusschere, who was voted the tournament's most valuable player, led the winners with 30 markers. Once again Bob McCully was named to the All-Tournament team.

Following the Motor City Classic, St. Bonaventure's Brown Indians returned to the familiar confines of the Olean Armory and trounced Belmont Abbey, 85-68 to post their eighth victory in 10 starts. Bob McCully paced the winning attack with 28 points and grabbed 15 rebounds.

The next three games proved disastrous for the Bonnies as they fell before Duquesne, Niagara and Canisius in that order. In the Duquesne rematch, it was the same story as the first game—too much Willie Somerset. In this one the 5-foot-10 sophomore connected for 29 points. Miles Aiken was high for the Bonnies with 23.

One week later Niagara's Purple Eagles paid their annual visit to the Olean Armory and upset the Bonnies for the second year in succession, 71-51. The Brown Indians cut the cords for only 20 markers in the entire second half after managing a 31-31 intermission standoff. Sharpshooting Andy O'Connell tossed in 29 points to lead the Purple Eagles to their crushing victory. Bob McCully paced the Bonnies with 17.

Now reeling from two successive setbacks the Bonnies moved into Buffalo's Memorial Auditorium for their first meeting of the season with the Golden Griffins of Canisius. A turnaway crowd of 11,562 saw the Griffins grab a 41-34 half-time lead after the two teams had battled evenly for most of the initial twenty minutes. Canisius, with Bill O'Connor leading the way, increased its lead to 12 with six minutes to go. Then the Bonnies began a rally closing the gap to 71-68 with less than four minutes remaining. This was as close as they came, however, as Bill O'Connor threw in five straight points to lock up the issue. O'Connor led all scorers with 27 points and Miles Aiken totaled 21 to lead the Bonnie scoring parade. The loss was the Brown Indians' fifth in 13 outings.

Following a ten day mid-semester break St. Bonaventure's Brown Indians returned to action facing Seton Hall at Madison Square Garden. The Bonnies emerged the winner drubbing the Pirates 113-100 to snap a three-game losing skein. The 213 total points set a new record for scoring by two college teams at the Garden. Seton Hall's sensational scoring star, Nick Werkman led the point parade meshing 40 markers. However, the one-man show failed to offset a balanced Bonnie scoring attack led by Aikens' 29 and McCully's 22 counters. Joyce, Jirele and Herbert totaled 19, 15 and 12 respectively.

Two nights later, Providence College handed the Bonnies their sixth defeat of the season, 71-60 at Memorial Auditorium in Buffalo. After leading by a point, 36-35 at the half, St. Bona fell behind following intermission and could never quite catch the Friars. Big Jim Hadnot came up with 15 second-half points, rebounded strongly off both boards, and sparked the Friars' second-half surge. He wound up with 28 points, the game high. Bona center Bob McCully had 19.

A rejuvenated scoring attack proved just the right medicine for the Bonnies in their next contest as they walloped Tennessee A and I, 111-104 at the Olean Armory. Bob McCully put on the greatest offensive show of his career and Miles Aiken came up with another great scoring effort to help the Bonnies offset a strong A and I running attack. McCully dropped in 39 points and Aiken hooped 33 for a 72 point total between the two. The win, renewed the Bonnies' fading hopes for a possible NIT berth.

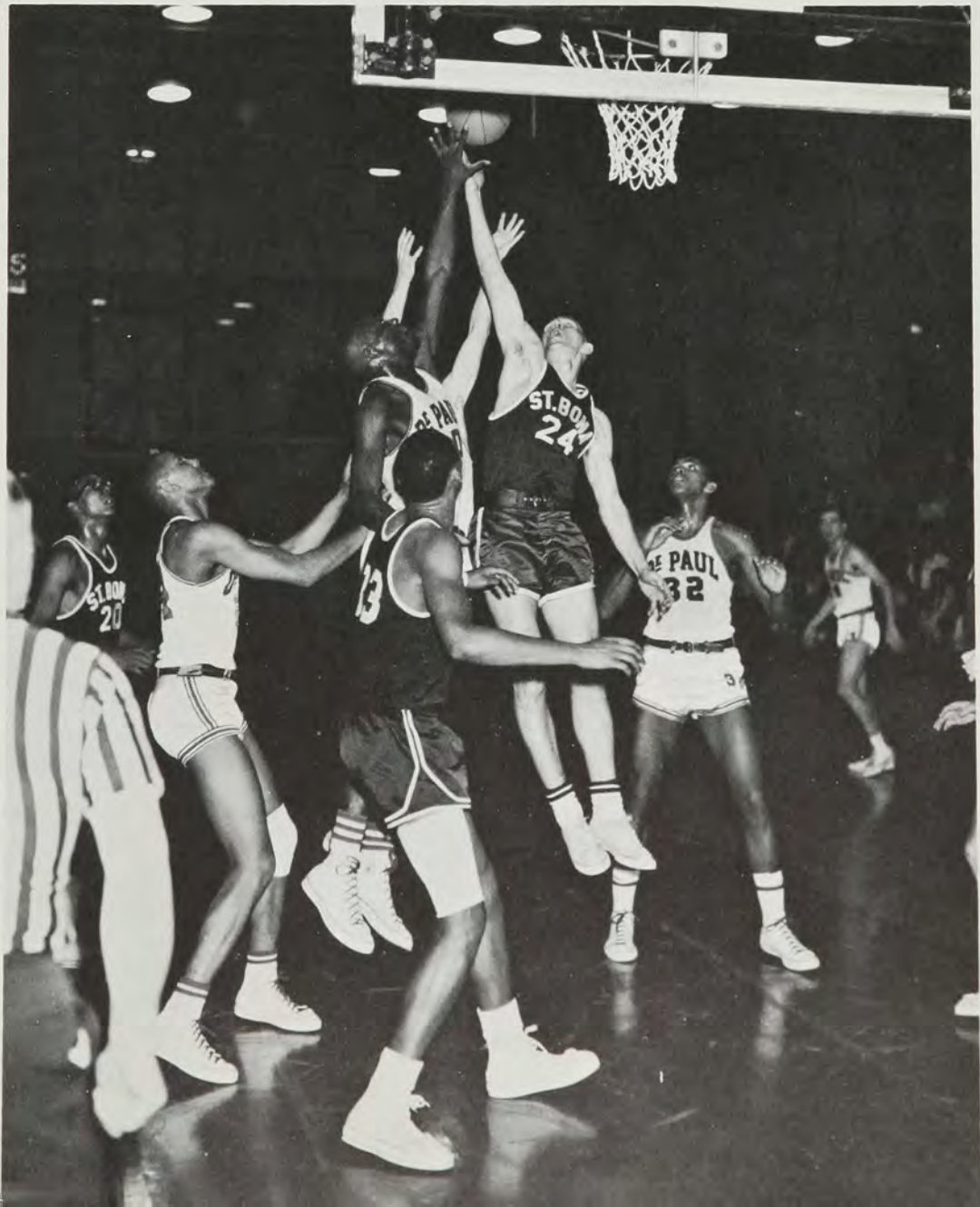


Barry Herbert dribbles away from basket after grabbing rebound in Iona game at Buffalo Aud.

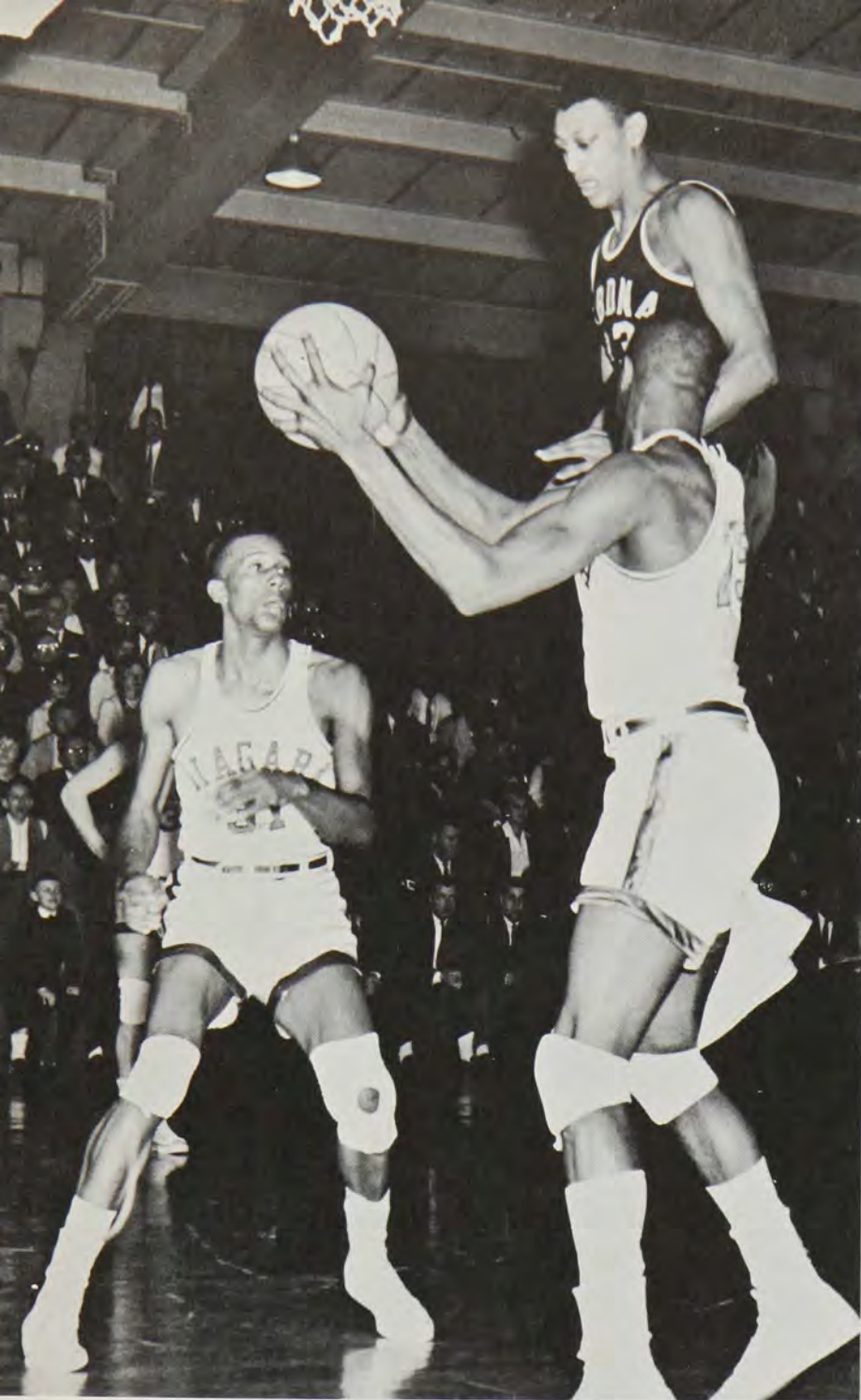
A driving finish gave the Bonnies an 88-62 win over Rhode Island in their next contest before more than 5,000 fans at Memorial Auditorium. Miles Aiken poured in 34 points to lead the Bonnies to their second straight victory. Rhody tried to make a game of it after trailing 51-36 at the half, but could not match Aiken's fine performance and that of Bob McCully who wound up with 15 points for the game.

The Bonnies then journeyed to the "windy city" of Chicago to meet the DePaul Demons. What had shaped up as one of the Bonnies toughest games of the season, proved to be somewhat of a mismatch as the Brown Indians routed the Demons 88-69. In undoubtedly their finest team performance of the season, the Bonnies rolled up a commanding first half lead, 48-30 and fought off a brief DePaul rally in the opening minutes of the second half to score their impressive win. Once again sophomore Miles Aiken led the scoring for the Bonnies, finding the range for 30 points. The victory brought the Brown Indians record to 12-6.

Now riding a three-game winning streak, St. Bonaventure next faced Iona at Memorial Auditorium. Once again the Bonnies high powered scoring attack proved too much of an obstacle for their opponents as they rolled over the Gaels, 84-67. After leading 42-38 at the intermission, the Brown Indians went on a scoring rampage as Barry Herbert and John Mahonchak ignited a second-half surge. Herbert paced the Bonnies with 23 points and John Mahonchak and Bob McCully followed with 21 and 20 respectively.

Riding the crest of a four game winning skein and with visions of an NIT berth dancing in their heads, the Bonnies next took on the Purple Eagles of Niagara in the Student Center. As in the first meeting of the two teams, Niagara again prevailed, this time 83-69. Joe Maddrey, returning to the lineup after a semester's absence, and Ken Glenn proved the difference as each contributed 21 points and controlled the boards for the most part. Bob McCulley led the Bonnies with 20.

With their NIT hopes now wrecked the Brown Indians met Canisius' Golden Griffins the following Saturday night at Buffalo's Memorial Auditorium.

Determined to avenge an earlier defeat and to end their season on a happy note, the Bonnies wiped out a nine point half-time deficit to whip the Griffins, 93-87. The Bonnies displayed their best balanced scoring attack of the season as five players hit double figures: Aiken led with 26 followed by McCully with 21; Mahonchak hit for 18, Jirele poured in 14 and Petrovick pumped in 12.

The win gave the Bonnies a final mark of 14-7 under rookie Coach Larry Weise.

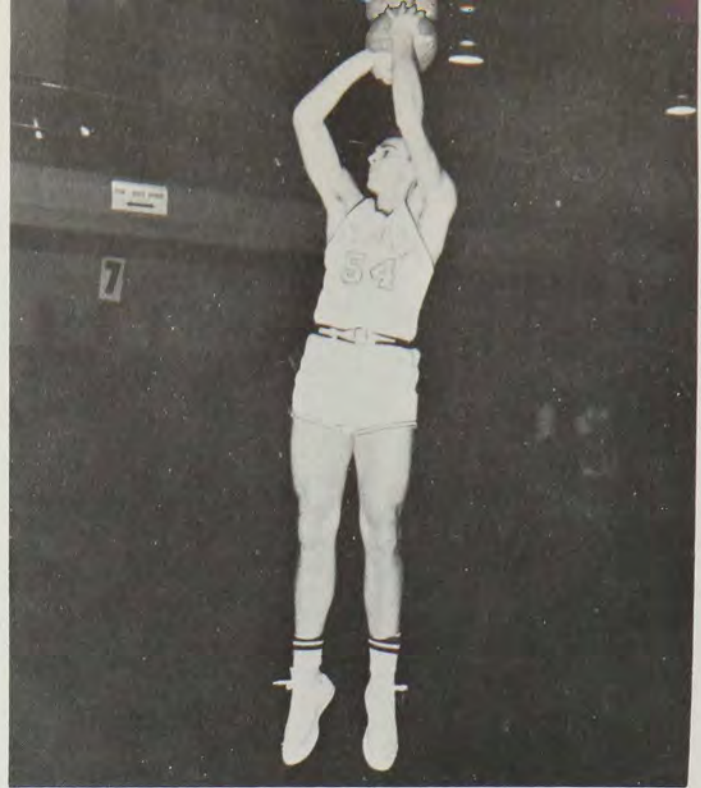

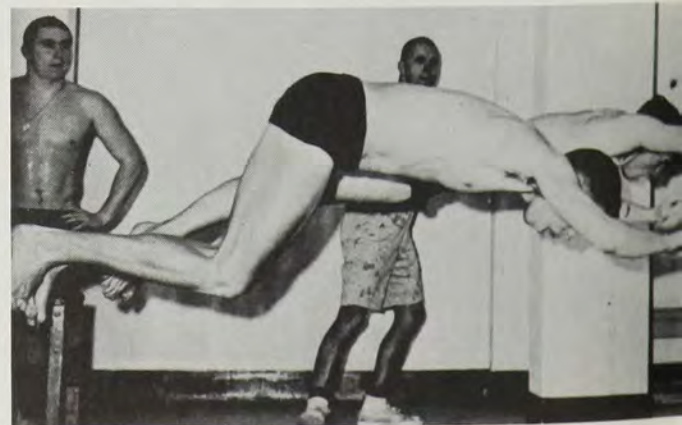

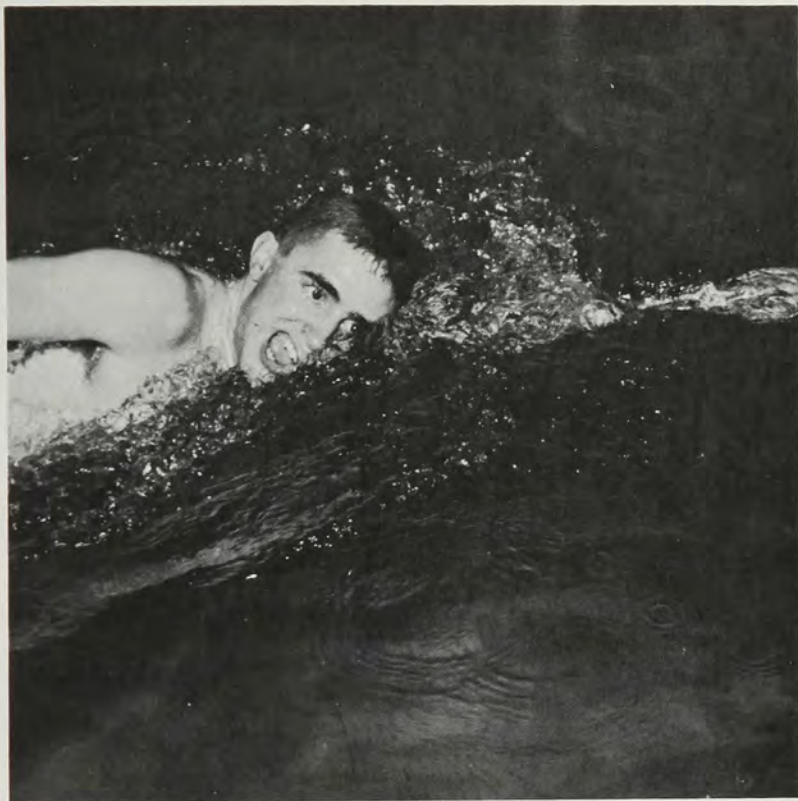
