Clare College

Since its creation, the goal of Clare College has been to give each student a common experience. It is a core curriculum that promotes a liberal arts education within the Franciscan heritage.

Students are required to take twelve courses, totaling 36 credits, throughout their college career. The courses range from history to science and are taught by professors from all different departments. Because the courses are interdisciplinary, students taking a class such as Inquiry into the Natural World learn about all the natural sciences, not just one.

As a member of the Association of General Liberal Studies, the Clare College is able to communicate with other universities that have similar curricula. Interaction with other universities showed the college ways that it could experiment and add variation to its courses.

The faculty believes it will enhance their professional and personal development. "It's our intention to have students examine more than just the obvious, to think critically, to think outside-the-box. Clare lets you sample outside the box," stated the dean of Clare College, David DiMattio, Ph.D.

and Sciences is a unique sector compared to the other disciplines St. Bonaventure University offers. The School of Arts and Sciences provides 95 percent of the Clare College offerings. It also provides 75 percent of the quantitative reasoning courses, all of the language requirements and majors for about 50 percent of the student body. Much of the faculty teaches about 75 percent of the undergraduate courses at Bonaventure. The main objective of the school is to provide students with a well rounded liberal education and to teach them written and oral

The school began offering new majors such as bioinformatics, theater, gerontology, and art history. FUTURE TEACHERS LEARN FROM THE BEST

The School of Education has many goals for its students, but its main purpose is to prepare innovative educators. With its nationally accredited programs, the School of Education integrates theory with practice. Led by Dean Dr. Peggy Yehl Burke, the school meets all of the professional standards. They provide a quality education by highly qualified faculty members.

This year the school added a Bachelor of Science in Childhood Studies for students who wish to work with children in a capacity other than teaching. There was also a proposal to offer a Bachelor of Science in Sports Studies for students who are interested in health, wellness, and physical activities but are not interested in being a physical education teacher.

Students prepared for teaching by gaining experiences in the classroom. Through the use of Professional Development Schools, students and professors partnered with local schools to nurture skills prior to student teaching. Students were able to get feedback and support as they learned from both professors and teachers in the classroom.

The School of Education prides itself on cultivating a close community with students. Students must have a 3.0 grade point average by their sophomore year. Because of this New York State requirement most students go into graduate school within the next three years of graduation.

Awards have been plentiful for the School of Education; it was one of the first programs to receive NCATE accreditation, which is internationally recognized. The faculty also received recent honors, such as the award for "Excellence in Teaching" and "Excellence in Service."

School of Franciscan Studies

CARRYING ON THE FRANCISCAN TRADITION

Through the School of Franciscan Studies, graduate students can earn one of two degrees: a Masters of Arts Degree in Franciscan Studies, and an Advanced Graduate Certificate in Franciscan Studies. Students must have a complete college degree, and have passed the Graduate Record Examination. They are required to take five core courses, such as Foundations of Franciscan Theology and Early Franciscan Movement. Fr. Michael Cusato, dean of the School of Franciscan Studies, said he hopes students gain "a better understanding of Franciscan tradition in terms of its history, its spirituality, its sources and its intellectual tradition of theology and philosophy." The School of Franciscan Studies is part of the Franciscan Institute, which Cusato also directs. The institute focuses on teaching, researching and publishing six to eight books and three periodicals each year. Staff and faculty of the institute edit the publications.

This year, the institute held one of four international conferences on John Duns Scotus. Eighty people from around the world attended the conference. The institute also received a million dollar endorsement for a lecture which was open for all members of the university.

The Franciscan Institute is located in the basement of the Friedsam Memorial Library.
