It is, however, a testimonial which carries with it the gratitude and appreciation of each member of the graduating class.







Et cum spiritu tuo.*






This is the small "caf" where Herm consumes his black coffee, toast and Dagnet for breakfast.


Small "caf" nighttime style. The Taxidermists meet at the table near the coffee stand.

Come, boys, let's all be gay boys;



Return to...

September of 1950: we arrived on campus and were duly greeted by Father Juvenal, welcomed by the Frosh Welcoming Committee and orientated by the faculty. There were nearly five hundred of us. Our first year at St. Bonaventure saw the granting of the University charter with such notables as the Apostolic Delegate to the United States (Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani), Governor Thomas E. Dewey and commentator George Sokolsky. This was an important step in Bonaventure history. Frosh rules seem to have lessened in severity since the year we took them, which saw on the editorial page of *The Bona-Venture* such headlines as "Why Frosh Rules," both as a question and as a declaration of this great tradition. The coeds joined us in rule-taking for the first time.

Football served as an appropriate introduction to that collegiate atmosphere. Our own freshman team, coached by Mitch Smiarowski and Ernie Virok, was termed a "powerful unit," with such promising players as Captain Joe Callahan, Don Walsh, Paul Butler, Don Manzini, Dick Banas, Roger Stemler, Joe Fagan, Dave Warsocki, Jim McKenna and Joe Graham. They played a formal schedule for the first time in many years. Varsity football, with Joe Bach in his first year as coach at Bona's, ended the season with seven wins to only two losses. The team was led by co-captains Jack Breslin and Stan Zajdel. The season was highlighted by the excursion to the Boston University game in October. Howzit week was a feature on the fall social calendar, with the Toledo football game and a dance afterwards. It was declared by Griff to be the "exceedingly highest type of week."

The BonaVenture featured a Frosh Bosh column by Harlow Webert, and Dr. Fred Kerr replaced the late Dr. Francis Andres as school physician.

Election of our class officers, held late in the year, gave us "Bingo" Dembowski as president, assisted by vice-president Joe Gianetto, Rocco Pietropaolo, secretary and Joe Mumm, treasurer. World unrest precipitated by the war in Korea dimmed the festive season, and was greatly responsible for the loss in numbers from our class over the four years.

Basketball that year featured the five outstanding sophomores, Kenville, Bednar, Edwards, Sassone and Davies. With them we anticipated two more years of good basketball, and our hopes were not wholly unfounded. Ed Melvin, in his fourth year as coach, led Bonaventure to a bid to the National Invitation Tournament in Madison Square Garden. Captained by Fred Diute, the Bonaventure team tallied up at eighteen wins to only five losses at the end of the year. The big basketball weekend was the Bona's-Cincinnati game in Madison Square Garden, which we won in a double overtime.

The Dramatic Club presented its outstanding production of *Harvey* with Bob Gabarino in the starring role, and *The Drunkard* featuring Vinnie Maguire, Joe Damiano, Dick Hurley and Mary Freaney.

Our Sophomore year saw Paul McCabe stepping up to the presidency to replace Joe Giannetto. Other officers were Jack Maley, secretary and Joe Graham, treasurer. Sophomore Senators were Bob Evers, Ron Ahrens and Jack Maley. That same year was the last for football at Bonaventure, and for Seniors Jerry Hanifan, Ben Popson, Tony Tisko, Greg Riel, Fred Specht, and George Hanley. Fran Henderson, Walt Czaja, Ted Marchibroda, John Romonogli, Frank Godlewski and Steve Karlovich, who were denied the opportunity of playing in their senior year, still have earned a place in our Bona memories. Joe Bach went from Bona's to Pittsburgh to coach the professional football Steelers. But who'll ever forget those speeches he gave at the night-before-the-game pep rallies?

As sophomores we were giving out demerits and the paddle to the frosh. St. Bonaventure's chapter of Delta Sigma Pi fraternity, having been granted a national charter, was dedicated to the memory of Bob Kinsella, the fraternity's first honorary member. Professor John J. Maloney died during the summer, and the fall semester saw the arrival of Father Anselm Hardy, among other faculty changes.

Gramercy Ghost, presented in Butler Memorial Gymnasium, was an awe-inspiring spectacle, with Tom Ryan, Lois Johnson, Hugh Donlon and the ghostly ghost, Joe Hogg.

Along about January the National Student Association's *Footlight Follies* helped to brighten the campus, with Ed Neilson as an excellent Master of Ceremonies.

The raffle to help send Father Robert Frawley to Japan to do missionary work was initiated in December. The prize was an expense-free excursion to New York City for the Bonaventure-St. John's basketball game. The weekend proved to be one of the most successful; more than one thousand students participated, with parades, publicity and Gilhully's. The basketball season wound up with our second N. I. T. appearance, and we won two before bowing out to Dayton. The season record was one of twenty-one wins and six losses. The seniors playing their last season were Captain Don Solinsky, Leo Corkery, Paul Nolan and Owen Gorman.

When Father Robert left for Japan he was succeeded as Spiritual Director by Father Evan Roche, and Father Regis Galvin replaced Father Aubert Conlon as Dean of Men when Father Aubert was forced to give up that position because of ill health.

Just as we were reaching new heights as a basketball power announcement came of the suspension of football at Bonaventure. The forecast that we could be a big-time football school, which was made with the coming of Hugh Devore to Bona's in 1946, had not been fulfilled. There was talk that year and in the next two years of a small school football league, but we did not see any action taken in that direction.

Father Basil Lobby was our moderator in our Junior year, and the new officers were Meade Butler, president, Jim Gilligan, vice-president, Gerry Maroney, secretary, and Gerry Mulvey, treasurer. Senators were Joe Sadlowski, Paul McCabe, and Jack Maley.

With football absent from the fall agenda, we were anxious to get into the basketball season. The "big five" seniors, Bill Kenville, Mike Bednar, Bill Edwards, Rog Davies, and Bob Sassone, started out what promised to be a tremendous year with five straight wins. Southern hospitality was completely lacking as Bona's went into the Sugar Bowl Tournament in New Orleans; we were beaten by St. Louis, Villanova and Western Kentucky on that trip South. This was followed by a mediocre season with a final tally of eleven wins and eleven losses. Hopes for another NIT bid were smashed, but Niagara's invitation to play in the Madison Square Garden event sparked student interest in the Tournament. Bill Kenville, rated our best senior athlete, kept his average at nineteen points a game and set a new Bonaventure scoring record, despite the only fair team record.

Father Irenaeus, college librarian, saw the successful ending of a thirteen year campaign in the printing of a stamp honoring Johann Gutenberg, which was issued in Washington to commemorate the five-hundredth anniversary of the printing of the first book ever set by moveable type, the Holy Bible. The Korean G. I. Bill brought a new group of vets to Bona's. A "Tulips for Brother Ferdinand" Day was highly successful and resulted in the planting of an abundance of tulips by Brother Ferdy which brightened the campus when Spring rolled around.

The interest of the students in the national elections was reflected in the great amount of political talk featured in *The BonaVenture*. The students voted in favor of Ike in an election which also moved "chow" time to five-thirty. Frosh rules, traditionally a subject of much pro and con discussion, became the center of a debate unprecedented in Bona annals. They are still with us, despite broken bones and other minor incidents.

Christ the King Seminary was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies in November, and Father Maurice Scheier, Guardian of the Monastery, celebrated his Silver Jubilee. Christmas saw the third annual party for needy children. It was a thrill to help those who had so little and were so appreciative of the little we gave them. Jack Maley served as vice-president of the New York State Region of the National Student Association. The Seton Hall game marked the second year that the Father Frawley Mission Fund benefited from a student excursion, as four hundred and fifty students went to New York.

Insanity and murder comprised the interesting program for the presentation of *Arsenic and Old Lace* in the gym. Featured were Ed Neilson, Ruth Fromholzer, and Mary Ellen Schriver, among others. The N.S.A. Variety Show featured the usual student crooners and combos, with Oscar Ruberti shining. A man named Minski was hailed as the showman of the year for his startling presentations.

Our Prom, featuring the music of Elliot Laurence, was a great success, thanks to co-Chairmen Dick McGrath and Jim Twohig and the Committee. More than five hundred couples danced in an atmosphere of "Paris After Dark."

The year ended in elections, and as we saw the Seniors depart we anticipated a good year, with Dick McGrath as president, Meade Butler vice-president, Bud Gilligan secretary, and Don Seitz as treasurer. Jack Maley was president of the Student Senate, and Joe Sadlowski vice-president. The other Senators were Paul McCabe (head of Student Activity Council) and Pat Lundy, off-campus. Gerry Mulvey brought honor to the campus when he was elected president of the N.S.A. New York State Region, and then chairman of the National Executive Committee.

It was with a feeling of achievement that we entered upon our last year at Bona's. And it was with a feeling of regret that we were to leave in June. In response to cries for more social life, the S.A.C. sponsored a dance; it was "snowed out." The Military Ball followed midterms so closely that we had hardly gotten over one when another big event was upon us. The results were almost catastrophic, but Thanksgiving helped the recuperating pro-

cess. The Ball, under the capable direction of Dick McGrath and Jim Twohig, featured the music of the Fredonia *Blue Notes* and was the highlight of the Fall semester.

Christmas featured another party for the needy children, and we filled out our sparse Winter activity calendar with basketball games in Olean and Buffalo, while another excursion was planned for the Seton Hall game in New York; the school calendar finally provided for this annual event.

Easter vacation was stunted by thoughts of comprehensives and finals. At Prom time we rested and enjoyed the results of much toil by the Juniors. We treated them the night after with our Senior Ball, and went back to work. At long last, we were able to settle down and enjoy Senior Week, feeling entitled to one last fling before entering the cruel world. We were well armed, though, carrying as a very part of us the spirit of the Father of the Poor and of all his followers who have served God and humanity, that which was given to us through our own professors and prefects, a spirit of loving God through loving His creatures.


Duffy stood out as he hooped 32 points and upped his average to 21 points a game. At one time he sank 10 points in a row to keep the Brown and White in the thick of it.
