
DEDICATION

Class History

A history? . . . rather the story of a life, a life which brought us together on a little plot of ground in the Cattaraugus hills. Who could have imagined it? — the slicker from a street corner in New York, the vet from a piece of foreign soil with an American flag on it, the small town boy with his varsity letter — thrown together in a common melting pot, spiced liberally with Franciscan understanding, a healthy measure of learning, a dash of the next fellow's personality, stirred well to conform to some ancient mystic formula . . . and here we are . . . Bonaventure men and women.

Where have the years gone? They haven't. They are here still, in these halls, down the center path, echoing and re-echoing through the classrooms, and chanting in the chapel. They are in the Olean armory, and out on Forness field, in the dining hall and on the parade ground.

A little recollecting will bring them back as real and everescent as ever . . . Remember that first bewildering day when we set our bags down on the bunk the other guy didn't want? And how for weeks we felt our way around, fearing lest we slip and someone laugh? . . . They did laugh as we wallowed in the mud back by the barracks and some heartless sophomore sent us in the puddle again chasing our dinks. But sophomores were rational, they told us, and we found it to be so . . . after rules. Yes, they made us sing "We hate Judge" but we didn't mean it. Then one day they called an untimely end to rules, so we missed out on the Frosh-Soph contest and had no Frosh day.

This didn't stop us. We were determined to prove we could still be Bonaventure men. So we stayed up all night waiting for Canisius to raid the campus . . . they never showed up.

We learned many things that first year, much of it from our texts, of course, but a lot of it from our new environment. We learned of the warmth and understanding which can come from a man





in a simple brown robe. We were initiated into the discipline of the military and came to know what makes the next guy tick. We learned the art of hitch-hiking, a talent we came to use extensively in the ensuing years. And who but a Bonaventure man can understand the rigors of a Bonaventure winter?

That year, 1954-55, we came to know what social life was like hereabouts and although few of us went to the Military Ball, one of our co-eds, Pat Gann did . . . and was elected queen. We were coming along in fine Bonaventure style and we emerged as an entity with the election of our own class officers. Things finally began to fall into place.

Bonas was O.K. but summer vacation was better. We went back to our home . . . but something was different. The old crowd didn't seem the same somehow. The Allegany Spirit had begun its mystic work.

The summer over, we returned. But this time it was different. We were sophomores . . . wise fools . . . we knew everything, our shoes were big and our hats too tight . . . and to prove it we fell to the task of making Bonaventure men out of the latest crop of freshmen.

It rained for Bona's only homecoming during our stay. And our first shot at a Frosh-Soph fight meant more to us than to the frosh. Of course, the Frosh won . . . they always do. Then there was Frosh Day, the only one we had ever seen.

We followed the team to Buffalo. At one game someone kicked in a bass drum that had been spurring Canisius to victory. That year, too, some few had the audacity to white-wash Canisius. Can't you see the good Griffins' faces when they found BONAS white-washed in six foot letters on their lounge floor!

Gradually, our shoes began to fit and when the Allegheny rose it found us a more sober crew. (Speaking of the flood, who was the guy that started the rumor about \$2.75 an hour being paid for stacking sandbags at Allegany?) As the sem-



ester ended, the prom chairman appointment was made and Diaper Row bit the dust.

We left the campus to summer session and to Griff. And when the Fall came, we found Griff waiting with his "Super Atomic Kentucky Derby Winners" . . . as if we hadn't left at all.

This was our Junior year. We were settled now with most of our confusion abated, we sought now to build upon the principles we had learned. With all of our maturity, however, we never did become accustomed to those 8 o'clock classes.

This was to be a big year for us . . . the prom was coming up and there was much to be done. We stopped to have a few laughs at the Fall Festival, as we had done in our first two years and as we were to do again the following year.

Christmas once again saw the kid's party sponsored by the Senate. A life size crib brought Bethlehem to the circle in front of the new dorms.

The prayers of two years were answered in February when we received and accepted a bid to the N . I . T . We went to New York en masse. We came back minus one . . . "Ray" Larsen was killed in an auto accident returning to his home after one of the games in the Garden. We did the best we could by him . . . the team, some 15 friars and a large portion of the class attended the funeral. We mourned, then went on to the semi-finals and back to Bonas.

The prom band was announced and Sam Donahue was to bring the Billy May sound to the armory. For weeks after the announcement people were heard asking Sam Dona-who? . . . but they nonetheless thrilled to the Slurping Saxes "on a roof-top in Manhattan" while a "Soft Summer Breeze" blew . . . all in the Olean armory of course. We proved to have the makings of another queen in our class as one of our co-eds was chosen to reign.

The next thing we knew we were being evaluated and fitted for our caps and gowns; and we had chosen our leaders for the final stretch. That was it . . . we were seniors. It has been a long,





long climb with plenty of assists and there we were on the top of the heap. And its been a good year to be on top.

A Prince of the Church opened the last year of a century which St. Bonaventure University had dedicated to people like us . . . an opening which began the closing of our stay here. Sixteen Bishops helped celebrate and the Governor stopped in to wish us luck. Big event followed big event and we spent the year in social and academic celebrating.

Plans for the erection of two new buildings were announced . . . and we looked towards Bona's future. But the present was very real as we ran our winning streak in the armory to 77 games. And that was only part of it. We beat both Niagara and Canisius twice, making up for past humiliations in grand style. The last Niagara game was played in the Eagle's fieldhouse and because of limited space, our student body was excluded. That didn't stop us, either, for cheering Bonamen were in evidence amid a flood of somber-faced Niagara supporters.

The juniors announced that Duke Ellington would play for their prom. We were glad to see them following so well in the traditions which we and those before us had set.


Once again we received and accepted a bid to the N. I. T. and we sent our hopes and prayers to the Garden with the team.

Ground for the new Arts Building was broken in the spring and it was then that we came to realize that we were soon to be part of Bona's great past. The structure was being built for others, our tenure was up. We had to look then away from these stately pines, away from the lazy, murky Allegheny . . . and out towards the world.

Bonas had given us all she had, all she knew how to give . . . and left her in return our love and loyalty. We left our tap roots, through which we would continue to draw aid and inspiration in spite of the miles and years which must necessarily separate us from her . . . and from each other.


There were two evident reasons for their success. One was a team which was a team in every sense of the word. Their spirit, determination and fight turned into victory after victory.


THE BID . . .






Bona Beats St. Joe


BONNIES TAKE THIRD IN NIT
